About Us:

African Relief and Development Foundation popularly known as ARDF is a non-profitable, non-governmental National organization registered and recognized by the Relief and Rehabilitation Commission (RRC), according to South Sudan NGO 2016 Act, with Registration number 834. It was established in 2017 with an aim to provide development and humanitarian services to extremely vulnerable communities affected by poverty and crises and enhance the transformation of their lives, ensuring total health for all.

ARDF was initiated, because of increasing demand for national humanitarian agencies which can reach the destitute communities affected by the crisis. During the 2013 crisis, most of the international NGOs' activities slowed down because their experts and managers left the country as the insecurity escalated. The continuous humanitarian reports on the need for humanitarian agencies' interventions to support the conflict-affected population in South Sudan gave us the enthusiasm of initiating the organization.

We deliver emergency Health, protection, WASH, Food security and livelihood, and related services to those affected by conflict, disaster, and disease, no matter where they are, no matter what the conditions. 




ARDF has been providing life saving healthcare services to vulnerable communities in all its operational areas through Mobile Medical Clinic, ensuring hard-to-reach communities have access to healthcare services.

In the mobile clinics, the services provided include;

Curative consultation, laboratory investigation using rapid diagnostic test kits, treatment of communicable diseases and injuries, immunization services, Antenatal care, skilled deliveries, postnatal care, and health education.

In addition, the mobile team ensures screen of children for malnutrition, provision of mental health and psychosocial support counselling, and referral of severe cases to the health centre or hospital for further medical investigation, treatment, and care.

ARDF has been undertaking comprehensive GBV response services including, health care services, Psychosocial support, and counselling. We also facilitate referral support for legal services.

ARDF employs a community participatory approach to address GBV issues in the community, ensuring women are engaged and empower with life skilled to improve on their socioeconomic status.

ARDF through its GBV program, community awareness sessions were provided on GBV prevention, community dialogues were conducted with stakeholders to combat harmful traditional norms towards women and girls.

ARDF continue to build the capacity of women, men, Boys, and girls on GBV prevention, and building the capacity of CBOs and partners staff on GBV mitigation measures.

WASH Program

ARDF has been providing water, sanitation, and hygiene (WASH) services to conflict-affected populations in Renk, and Melut counties of Upper Nile and Aweil East of Northern Bahar El Gazal.

To improve beneficiaries' access to clean and safe drinking water, ARDF's key activities implemented include the repair of broken boreholes, conducting water quality tests, establishing, and training of water user committees, training of local hand pump mechanics, provision of water treatment tablets,

To improve the hygiene and sanitation of the affected communities, ARDF key activities focused on hygiene and sanitation awareness, training of hygiene promoters on integrated hygiene education messages, construction of climate-resistant institutional latrines,

Conduct household-initiated latrine construction, distribution of WASH non-food items, and distribution of reusable pads for menstrual hygiene management (MHM)

Food Security and Livelihood Program

ARDF's Food Security and Livelihood Program focuses on improving beneficiaries' food security, improving the nutritional status of children under 5 years as well as pregnant and lactating mothers, and improving the economic status of beneficiaries' households.

ARDF's FSL key activities include the Distribution of agriculture inputs, post-distribution monitoring,

Training of farmer's groups on agronomic best practices. Each farmers' group has 20 individual farmers.

Training of households on kitchen gardening

Conduct household awareness on environmental conservation.

Training of households on fuel-efficient stoves and Biogas

Distribution of fishing gear to fishing communities and training the households on aquafarming.


Figure 18: New Bike to support supportive supervision


Figure 17: Delivering Hospital Bed to Abayok PHCC in Renk


